
Viet Nam ratified the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW).

one year later passed the
Law on Domestic Violence
Prevention and Control.

The Government of Viet Nam has recognized the imbalanced sex ratio at birth and taken efforts to address the issue through policies and legislation, aiming to return the sex ratio at birth to the biologically normal level after 2025.

Sex Ratio at birth



The sex ratio at birth in Viet Nam has increased rapidly

to 111.5 boys for every 100 girls born in 2019.

2018

The sex ratio at birth in Viet Nam is already high at the first birth (110.2) and reaches

120.2 boys per 100 girls at the third birth, according to the 2019 Census.
